




A Big Storm

"OK," Jim answered. "But listen, Eric. There's going to be a big storm. Stay near the house. Do you **promise**?"


Eric promised.

Tania walked up and down the room. Suddenly, she stopped moving.


"What's that noise?" she said.





In the morning, Eric opened the door. It was very cold. He looked back at the golden seal.



Eric put some salmon on the floor in front of the seal. Then he looked into her eyes. "Don't be frightened," he said. "My father isn't going to shoot you. I promise."







Maybe he managed to find the golden seal? Crawford suddenly thought. No! How can a small boy find a golden seal?


"Let's go," he said. "I'm going to take you back."

Jim suddenly stopped walking. He looked down at his son. "Say that again—slowly," he said.




"She's a golden seal, Father. And she's my friend."



Suddenly, the sun came out and Jim saw the bear. It was very near them. Jim didn't make a noise.


im, Tania, and Eric sat down at the table for some food, but Crawford didn't want any.

Eric sat down in the sand. "Don't be frightened," he said to her quietly. "It's only me."


Jim was behind him. He had his gun in his hand now. "Don't go near her," he said. "She's an animal and she's with her pups."

They started to run home. They had the same picture in their heads: the bear, its mouth red with blood,





"I promise." Crawford smiled. But this promise isn't important, he thought. It's only a






little boy's game.










Back to the Ocean

With Jim's gun, he quietly went out of the house and into the sand dunes.




Crawford moved quietly, with the gun in his hand. *Now*,

Now! he thought. Goodbye, golden seal.








behind him in the sand. But he did hear a noise—the noise of a big, angry bear!

The family watched them for a long time. The seals were now very small, out in the ocean.


Tania looked at Jim and moved near him.




